Michael Scully of PNC

Mr. Michael Scully is the Regional President for PNC in Greater St. Louis. He has been engaged with the Boy Scouts of America in various capacities throughout his lifetime beginning as a Scout in his youth. He has had the honor to support the Greater St. Louis Area Council through volunteerism, philanthropy, and eight years of service to the board including terms as president, treasurer, and head of the search committee for our current Scout Executive/CEO, Joe Sadewasser.

Michael received the highest recognition the Council confers upon its volunteer leaders in 2020 by earning the Silver Beaver Award, during a year that challenged all of us, yet also served as a reminder of why the Council's legacy of service to our communities remains relevant and why Scouting continues to endure.

When asked what quality or trait in Scouts he admires the most, Michael responded, "the Scouts' longstanding commitment to carrying out acts of service reflects more than an ideal or aspiration; it creates impact in the communities where we live and work, which is incredibly meaningful for our region and its future." Michael's favorite memory as a Scout was his summer camp experiences, "for many of us, this was the first time we spent time away from home,

which encouraged us to develop independence, confidence, and self-sufficiency. The summer camp experience helped us hone new skills and work toward goals." He added, "while much has changed since my time as a Scout, and as increasingly more enrichment opportunities are made available to youth, I am glad to see the summer camp experience continue for the 6,000+ Scouts in our region who participate each year."

As a local business leader, Michael recognizes the importance of investing in and developing our region's future leaders and workforce. Cultivating leaders begins at an early age, and Scouting can be an effective vehicle for nurturing talent and building character.

PNC has a history of supporting the Scouts in several markets throughout their coast-to-coast footprint. In St. Louis, the organization and employees have partnered with the Scouts on a variety of efforts during the majority of PNC's tenure in the region. They choose to partner with the Greater St. Louis Area Council because beyond the community impact of the BSA's acts of service, Scouting plays a key role in the development of our region's future workforce. "It is not difficult to see the strong link between Scouting and future success, anecdotally, but this link has been quantified and validated by a Washington University research study, which correlated Scouting participation with increased likelihood of receiving a bachelor's degree and advanced graduate degree, among other favorable indicators for personal income and economic mobility."

PNC would like to encourage other businesses to support the Greater St. Louis Area Council because "the principles of the Scout Law are indisputably positive and broadly relevant to business and civic interests, by creating impact in the community through acts of service and developing our region's future leaders through youth leadership efforts. As a company deeply committed to the Greater St. Louis region, PNC believes in supporting organizations that create impact for our local communities, support youth and are meaningful to our employees. Our collaboration with the Greater St. Louis Area Council of BSA, including our support for the annual Scouting for Food drive, has helped us deliver on these objectives."

When asked what one thing he wished everyone knew about Scouts, Michael responded, "There are multiple pathways and entry points to participate in Scouts – whether that be a continuous progression from Cub Scouting to earning the Eagle Scout Award or taking part in the Venturing or Exploring programs. Being a Scout is not a one-size-fits-all experience, and there are benefits to participation at every phase."
